Parish Council Round Up - February-March 2024

Planning & Development

The early part of 2024 has seen a significant focus on planning and development in Keyingham. Building operations were suspended by ERYC at the site of Mt Airey farm, in February a new application was made to develop land to the west of Church Lane (or 'Cow Field' as it is sometimes referred to locally) with a proposal for 16 'first home' dwellings and in March a strategic development proposal was put forward for 147 dwellings on the site of Village Nurseries. An amendment to a condition relating to the Strawberry Fields development also raised concerns from neighbours. The proposed development on Church Lane was met with huge public concern and at the February meeting the Parish Council voted to oppose the development on a range of grounds including road safety, drainage and environmental impact. https://newplanningaccess.eastriding.gov.uk Reference number: 24/00263/OUT The proposal for 147 dwellings on the site of Village Nurseries was received at the March meeting, with a relatively short deadline of April 10th for comments and/or queries. Unlike the proposed development on Church Lane, the land associated with this proposal is identified in the local area strategic plan as a 'brownfield site' suitable for development and as such the site itself had already been subject to environmental impact assessments.

Due to the scale of this proposal the Parish Council planned to hold a dedicated meeting to provide a considered and timely response to the proposal.

Road Safety in Keyingham

At The February meeting of the Parish Council Cllr Sean McMaster was once again joined by representatives of the Traffic Management and Capital Projects teams to provide an update on the proposed works to improve the road crossing. To improve the crossing includes repainting the road markings, adding lighted studs to the road either side of the crossing itself, replacing the beacon poles with a new type of lighted pole. The beacons themselves will be brighter with LED halos and the street lighting in the immediate vicinity with be slightly less bright to make the crossing stand out more. Lighted advance warning signs will also be placed at each size of the road to ward of an upcoming road crossing.

The Parish Council has been informed that this work will be carried out in June – July. At present there is only one other crossing of this type in the East Riding and it appears to be working well.

CCTV

We are still awaiting a start date for the installation of the CCTV cameras and were informed recently that the current hold-up is due to a long wait for the fabrication of a higher pole required for the camera in the main street beside close to the crossing. Updates will be posted on the website as we receive them. It may be that the erection of the pole may coincide with work to the road crossing due to the lighting requirements for each of these projects.

Keyingham Village Hall

The Village Hall continues to complete a steady stream of improvements and repairs, thanks to the Village Hall Committee, Parish Councillors and an army of volunteers. The Village hall now has a postcode, which will enable a new, broadband connection.

At the March meeting it was agreed that the Parish Council will be responsible for the broadband connection and prices/packages are currently being considered. Activities over the next months include plastering and repair work inside the stage and 'old kitchen' areas.

Up-coming events include the 'packed and popular' weekly coffee mornings and on 30th March there will be an Easter Egg Hunt, (in partnership with Boyes Lane Recreation Ground Charity).

Keyingham Crest /Coat of Arms

Over the last three meetings there has been discussion about a Keyingham Crest or Coat of Arms which had previously existed and been used in various ways to reinforce the identity and culture and history of the village of Keyingham. After a little searching Cllr Lawton was able to produce a match book with the crest printed on it and it was agreed that it would be nice to 'polish it up a bit' and bring it back into use. At the March meeting Cllr Smith shared a black and white version of the emblem, updated and in a format which could be easily reproduced. Conversations have now begun about 'colours' including green and gold. The Crest can be seen on page 5 of this magazine – have a look and tell us what you think!

The Student Council members recently enjoyed a visit to Hedon Town Council and were hosted by the Mayor, Town Clerk and Mace Bearer in full regalia. Student Council members sat in the civic chamber, tried on the civic robes and practiced carrying the ceremonial mace. 
New Keyingham Emblem

1st Keyingham Scouts & Cubs

1st Keyingham Scouts and Cubs is thriving! We currently have 39 young members which is fantastic. This term we have been extremely busy with various activities and events including a weekend trip to London for the Scouts and an overnight camp to Gulliver's theme Park for the Cubs. The young people have also taken part in sessions including Chinese new year, baking, mothers day gifts, night hikes, mental health sessions and team work. Scouting is the UK's largest youth organisation. Each week over 400,000 young people and 100, 000 volunteer adult members take part in Scouting projects and activities which are at the heart of the UK's communities.

1st Keyingham Scout section has been running continuously in the village since 1968 and has seen 100's of young people pass through the sections, some staying on to be young leaders or adult volunteer members.

To enable our Scout section to continue from September we require 3-4 Adult (18+) volunteers to join our Team of volunteers . Scouting is wholly voluntary and without our amazing volunteers scouting wouldn't be possible. Our adults have just as much fun as the children and there are open ended opportunities to take on as much or as little as you would like . Ever fancied being an Air Rifle Instructor? Attending an International Jamboree? Possibilities are endless.

NO experience of scouting is necessary at all. We all have some skills we can teach our young people - it may be crafts , knife skills, knots, cooking, games, sewing badges on, diy, making a cup of tea, tying shoelaces, acting, singing, hiking, camping to name but a few . Full support, free uniform and training will be given , you will be fully supported throughout your scouting journey. Our Scouts meet on Thursdays 730-ppm in the village hall. A commitment of around 2 hours per week is all we ask please . You will take an active part in the planning of the programme for the term and help to deliver this to the young people.

Are you ready to take our 4 week challenge:

Week 1 - Come and see what we do and chat we our amazing Volunteer Team Week 2 - Help out - maybe help another adult to run a game at the beginning or end of the session Week 3 - Get a little more involved - maybe plan a game or small activity and ask other adult team members to help you Week 4 - Decide if volunteering is for you

Minimum age for an adult Volunteer team member is 18, with no maximum age . Maybe your child attended scouting and they're now grown up and you'd like to give back to the community? You're a grandparent with lots of life skills and enjoy working with children? You're a parent that would like to do something different for an hour or two a week? Your a parent of a scout or cub and want your child to be independent and grown their wings - that's brilliant - please help us in another section from the one your child is in.

Volunteering is good for our mental health. It is rewarding, allows you to make new friends, provides adventure and new skills and fills you with a sense of pride and achievement.
