Parish Council Round Up September – November 2021

Boyes Lane Recreation Ground

Following the council meeting in October we held the first meeting of the Trustees of Boyes Lane Recreation Ground to include the four new Council members as trustees of the Charity. The discussions benefitted from the perspectives provided by the new Trustees and a few members of the public stayed on to listen to the debate and decisions taken. It was agreed at the meeting that equipment would be hired to disperse the soil mounds and that any rubble or glass would be removed by hand. This was carried on 8th November and positive feedback has been received on the results.

The Trustees have received a request to consider creating further planting and possibly some benches on the newly levelled area which is being considered. The Trustees meeting was held immediately following the Parish Council meeting as a ‘trial arrangement’ It was agreed that this had not been effective, and in the interest of achieving greater separation of the functions ‘Councillor’ and ‘Trustee’ it is planned to hold the meetings on separate evenings in future. The next meeting of the Trustees will take place on 19th January 2022.

‘Save Our Children’ Signs

A ‘live issue’ for the Parish Council in October and November has been the positioning of the two ‘Save our Children’ signs along the A1033 at either end of the village. The sign to the east has been temporarily removed to facilitate the development of ‘Strawberry Fields’ and will be replaced together with the ‘Keyingham’ boundary sign as soon as it

is possible to do so without impeding works or visibility for motorists. The PC has also requested an extension to the 30mph limit to encompass the new development. ERYC have indicated that planning permission will be required to re-site the sign at the end of the Strawberry Fields development.

At the November meeting we received a letter from the ERYC Planning Enforcement Team, requesting the removal of the sign to the west of the village. The council were surprised by the request, for several reasons, not least of all because the sign had been there for many years without issue, and that recent advice has indicated that planning permission was not required. The PC resolved to challenge this request and are proceeding to make a case to retain the sign with the support of ward Councillors. Unsurprisingly, there is a groundswell of strong feeling on behalf of residents wishing retain the signs, especially in the light of the serious incidents which have taken place along the stretch of road between them. The PC and Ward Councillors are working hard towards a mutually agreeable outcome based on the retention of both signs. It is the Parish Council’s view that if the signs save one person from harm by acting as a reminder to take care while travelling through the village then their purpose has been served. Further updates will be provided via the website and followed up in the next ‘*Forward.*’

Keyingham Primary School Student Council

The Keyingham Primary School Student Council are really getting up to speed

with their OPAL project - which is to make play and learning more engaging for all pupils.

It has been really exciting working with the Student Council this year especially their approach to promoting school values and making their learning environment more inclusive. Due to the timing of this edition of the *Forward* it has not been possible to include the 'spotlight' article as their next meeting is not until 30th November- so please look out for the special feature on the Student Council and OPAL in the next edition of the *Forward*.

Dog Exercise Area

At the November meeting Councillors discussed placing restrictions on the hours of use in order to reduce disturbance experienced by the closest residents both early in the morning and late into the evening. Councillors considered the possible benefits of changing the hours of use in wintertime, although it was felt that people may need to exercise dogs during hours of darkness, before and after work. Members also considered placing notices additional notices requesting co-operation and consideration from users of the facility to use the *Forward* Magazine to ask users to be considerate to local residents by keeping noise as low as possible. It was agreed that areas of grass within the area required re-seeding, and an offer by a resident to donate dog agility equipment was grateful accepted. A member of the public attending the meeting asked the council to consider supporting dog waste bags and dispensers and members agreed to investigate the cost of offering this facility

Police Walkabouts:

Please help the Police to help communities..

Councillors joined PCSO's on the first of the series of 'Village Walkabouts' advertised in the last edition of the *Forward*. A key message to come from the police regarding antisocial behaviours of any kind is to encourage residents to report them using the non-emergency 101 number – because this helps to create a picture of where there are repeated instances of antisocial activity, which in turn leads to a more focussed police presence in those areas. So, even though it may *feel* like reporting it does not help- it really does..

Remembrance Sunday

On 14th November many of people took part in a Service of Remembrance. During the church service, with reference to remembering acts of great heroism, Rev. Janice Sharp shared a story of a torpedoed ship, almost broken, and at risk of sinking,

it was helped back to harbour by another vessel which came alongside and lashed herself to the ailing ship, providing steering and support to make it back to safety. The theme of the message included the support we can give when we 'come alongside' someone who may be struggling or has a big job to do.

Within a few minutes, still pondering on this poignant message and its many parallels in our community, Our Parish Clerk, Julia Billaney was given the 'big job' of laying the first wreath with Cllr Hoggard, Cllr Stephenson, Cllr Medforth and Cllr Maxwell who 'came alongside' what an honour for us all, thank you.

Cllr David Clark then laid the wreath on behalf of the Parish Council, followed by many tributes from organisations and individuals, providing a fitting tribute to all those who served.

This year we observed the act of remembrance in the grounds of St. Nicholas Church laying wreaths at the foot of a silhouette created by Mr Duncan Kirk. Afterwards the many wreaths were gathered up and placed beneath the memorial where they will remain well into the new year.



This year sees the 100th Anniversary of the dedication of our War Memorial which was sited in the centre of the village and dedicated to the memory of those who served and those who gave their lives in the first World War 1914-1918.

The formal dedication ceremony, captured in photographs kindly lent by Mr Neville Clark, was held in October 1921. Plaques were added to the memorial to recognise the service and sacrifice of those who served in the second World War 1939-1945 and has become the focus of annual remembrance of those lost in conflicts which followed.

Alongside the photographs lent by Mr Clark is the original Halifax Commercial Bank book which details the deposits as the Parish saved funds to purchase the memorial.

Here we are again: another Advent and, hopefully, through the worst of the pandemic and ready to get back to 'normal life'.

Except, of course, we have never left normal life!

'Normal life' is all about dealing with constant change; sometimes life smooths out for a bit, other times it's bumpy, other times there are great roller-coaster climbs, dives and loop-the-loops, and the occasional vertical drop!

The vicar at Withernsea and for the 'Coastal Benefice', is leaving soon to take up a new post. This means that from the middle of January two of the four benefices in the Deanery will be in vacancy. So that when it comes to covering the Communion, weddings, funerals and all other services across the 23 churches of the Deanery there will be two full time and two retired, part time, clergy.

Taken all together we will be able to worship across the churches, share Holy

Communion, and make sure that our service to each other and to the local communities is sustained and developed. However, it will only be possible to do this by changing the way we do things, and this will work best the more of us who support it.

The biggest change is likely to be the frequency with which congregations celebrate Communion and we are now developing a pattern of Church services that is sustainable.

This is where we need to remember the reality of 'normal life'. Normal life does not equal a 'quiet life'—far from it! But, a 'Christian life' does equal a life that is touched by the peace and grace of God, and is well anchored to the one who gives us life and who walks the road with us.
